What am I?

I am a perennial native herb of Eastern North America including Wisconsin and can be found growing in prairies, rock outcrops and roadsides. I prefer full sun in zones 4-8 and grow to a height of 2-4 feet in medium moist sand, loam or clay. My tooth edged leaves which can be a foot long are widely dispersed near my plant base and their concentration and size decrease near the top of my plant. Underground a tuberous root is found. I have white compound flowers in an inflorescence which can reach 8 inches in diameter. My plant blooms in summer and fall and the flowers are known for their pleasant but medicinal fragrance.

The central taproot of my plant is thickened and tuberous in appearance and rhizomes promote its vegetative spread. My flowers attract bees, wasps, flies, and beetles. The beetles feed on the pollen while the other insects seek the nectar. I am deer resistant. Although rare and unusual, I am a worthy garden plant with my good form, excellent foliage, long bloom time and resistance to insects and disease.

Answer to What am I?

I am wild quinine. Order: Asterales. Family: Asteraceae / Compositae – Aster family. Genus: Parthenium L. – feverfew. Species: Parthenium integrifolium L. – wild quinine. Other names: Prairie-Dock, Cutting Almond, Nephritic Plant, American Feverfew. European settlers of the Midwestern United States discovered this herb to be used for coughs and sore throats as well as in treating burns by the Native Americans. Wild quinine was used as substitute for the bark of the Cinchona tree, which was in short supply during World War I, as a treatment for malaria. The conservation status of wild quinine is considered to be threatened in Wisconsin. I can be found in the rain garden adjacent to the Coughlin Center.

Expand Your Garden with Native Perennials

Join the Winnebago County Master Gardeners on Saturday morning, March 28, 2020, for a fascinating look at how you can use Native Perennials in your garden. Natives are good for the environment, encourage pollinators and provide food for many birds and insects. They are drought and disease resistant and don't need fertilizer. Featured speakers are Justin Kroening from Stone Silo Prairie Gardens in DePere and Loris Damerow, Landscape Designer and Civic Gardening Coordinator.

Justin has owned Stone Silo since 2004 and he and his nursery are committed to the preservation of native species and encourage their use in landscape design. Justin will discuss a selection of native plants and how native cultivation may vary from non-native perennials.

Loris Damerow is a former Master Gardener and has served as past President of the <u>Wild Ones</u>, <u>Fox Valley Chapter</u>. Wild Ones promotes the use of native plants in home and civic landscaping.


