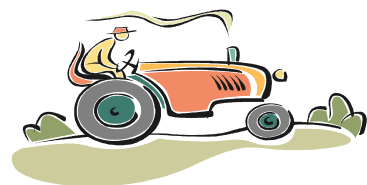

## NICK'S NOTES

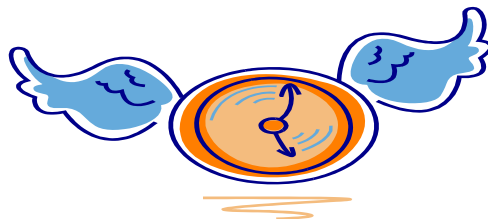
Master Gardener Booth at Farm Technology Days  
Please volunteer in the Master Gardener booth at the Wisconsin Farm Technology Days just 40 miles away in Brown County! Every year the Wisconsin Farm Technology Days moves to a different county around the state. During my first year in UW-Extension, the county I served was hosting. As a new County Ag Agent, this was great way for me to become acquainted with the people in the community. Since then, I had the opportunity serve in the "Progress Pavilion" (the Extension tent). It was quite enjoyable. Master Gardener Associations in the area are asked to take a time slot in the Master Gardener Volunteer booth to help answer questions. Eight associations per year are needed to help. After communicating with Bob Tomesh, UW Horticulture Specialist, I selected Wednesday morning, July 16th, from 8:00 a.m. to noon for the Winnebago County Association. Unknown weather aside, this is the best time slot. All exhibits will be set up by Wednesday and mornings are more comfortable. Each Association needs to provide 4 volunteers willing to serve the ½ day shift. You will get a free day pass. You will have plenty of time in the afternoon to tour the 600 exhibits of the 60 acre tent city. Attractions include activities in the Family Living Tent, Gerrits family home tour, and the Arts and Crafts tent. ## HOURS ANSWERS

1. Hours are due into Shelley AAholm no later than August 31.
2. The first thing to know about hours is that EVERYONE MUST work a minimum of 24 volunteer hours each year. Certified members **only** must also do a minimum of 10 hours of continuing education every year to keep up their certification.
3. Of the 24 volunteer hours you must work 10 hours on a sanctioned MG project before your Individual project hours will count. 5 of the remaining 14 hours **MUST BE** doing some type of Community Education. This can be done by working in the office as a Plant Health Care Advisor, working at the Farmers Market or any other event we are answering questions from the community. If you'd like you can also write an article for the newsletter or do a presentation to a group. If you are uncertain your selection will meet the requirement as any Board Member or email [linda@americanpresstech.com](mailto:linda@americanpresstech.com)

### Treasurer's Report

The balance in the MG checking account on May 31, 2008 was \$8,345. The total of all accounts was \$13,596.46. May expenses totaled \$380.20 and income \$194. The report was approved.

### Secretary's Report

There were no additions or corrections to the May board minutes as published in the newsletter, and the report was approved.

### OLD BUSINESS

#### June Picnic

67 people have signed up for the June 10 picnic so far.

### NEW BUSINESS

#### Community Education Lead

There is still no lead for Community Education Committee. Audrey Ruedinger will ask Marge Menacher to consider it. Kathy Daniels and Mary Wiedenmeier will send Audrey a job description for the position. Dorothy Gayhart-Kunz currently has the information boards that are used for displays.

#### Worm Castings

All of the previously purchased worm castings are gone. Ken will contact Steve Schueller to see what the cost is and in what quantities it is being sold.

Less will be ordered this time. Lynn Goudreau may still have some of the original barrels. Nick Schneider will check with her as he can also use the barrels at the community gardens. There is some space available in the UW Extension garage that could be used for a bagging operation and limited storage. A fresh supply is needed quickly for the farm market.

### **Habitat for Humanity Project Application**

Habitat for Humanity's request for \$400 for each of approximately seven houses to be built in 2009 would push the budget for this project past the \$2,000 limit. However, it may not be possible to do a smaller number of houses as Habitat must provide the same amenities for each new owner. Other suggestions included purchasing a tree for each home or just offering volunteers to mentor new homeowners in landscape care. Another possibility would be to steer new MG's toward this project to get their hours under the supervision of a previously certified MG. Bob Potter made a motion to propose to Habitat a plan that would provide \$50 per home (maximum 7) to purchase a tree along with a MG mentor and one or two new MG's to educate the homeowner in planting and maintenance of their new landscape. Linda Werner seconded the motion. Mary Wiedenmeier will discuss this offer with Gary Ludlewski to see if he will accept/decline or want to modify the proposal. The final plan will be brought to the membership to determine interest.

### **Individual Project Request**

Linda Tobey submitted a personal project application to assist the Family Resource Center in planning and teaching gardening skills to adults and children. No funding was requested and only a few hours would be needed. Linda Werner made a motion to approve the request. Stan Meyer seconded it and the motion was approved.

### **Cookbook Sales**

There are about 300 cookbooks left. Kathy Daniels recommended that the price be reduced to \$8 for sale at the Farmer's Market. Bob Potter made a motion to sell the cookbooks for \$8 each as a Farmer's Market special. Alice Graf seconded the motion and it was approved.

### **Basic Classes**

Nick Schneider will schedule a pre-class introductory session on July 31 at 6 p.m. for new participants in the basic class. The session will allow Nick to get the paperwork, including a background check application, out of the way and to stress the MG focus on volunteering and community education. Some board members will be asked to talk about the MG program. The meeting will be publicized through mailings to people on the list and a press release. A second session may be scheduled in August, depending on the attendance on July 31.

### **Mentor Program for New Trainees**

Kathy Daniels proposed a mentor program to help with retention of new MGs. Audrey Ruedinger reported that a

previous attempt to initiate a mentor program was not very successful. A more pro-active approach to keeping in touch with new MGs might work better. There was also a suggestion to tie the mentoring to a specific project such as the proposed Habitat for Humanity project. No decision on initiating a program was made at this time.

### **Dues Date Change**

December is a difficult time to collect dues from members because people are very busy and there are a lot of other expenses. After some discussion, Bob Potter made a motion to change the annual dues due date to August 31 to coincide with turning in the annual hours form. Linda Werner seconded the motion and it was approved. The change will be explained in the newsletter and the new Basic Class will start out on that schedule, as the membership fee is part of the class registration cost.

### **County Fair**

Alice Graf received a request for MG to fund two 4-H awards at the county fair. One would go to the outstanding garden exhibit and the other to the outstanding exhibitor. Marge Bolding said the past practice has been to provide \$25 per award. She made a motion to again fund the two awards at the \$25 level. Stan Meyer seconded the motion and it was approved. Marge will also be at the fair to present the awards.

### **Farm Progress Days**

Nick Schneider called for volunteers to staff at booth at the 2008 Farm Progress Days to be held in Greenleaf in mid-July. Four people are needed to take a four-hour shift. He will send out an email to all members.

## **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

**Education Committee:** Dates for the invasive and native plant ID walk are still pending. September 13 or 17 are possibilities. It will take the place of one of the September classes. Nick Schneider and Audrey Ruedinger are working on confirming the date and speakers. It will take place at the Waukau Nature Preserve. Carpooling will be necessary due to limited parking. Everything should be finalized by the July Board meeting.

**The Paine:** The spring plant sale/festival was successful. The weather was good and the MG booth sold out of worm castings and handed out a lot of brochures.

**Garden Walks:** The May garden tour at the homes of Bob Potter and Marge Bolding were very nice. Attendance was good and there were a lot of positive comments. The next garden walk will be at the home of Linda Tobey on June 17. Audrey Ruedinger will line-up another garden walk for August.

The meeting was adjourned at 8 p.m.

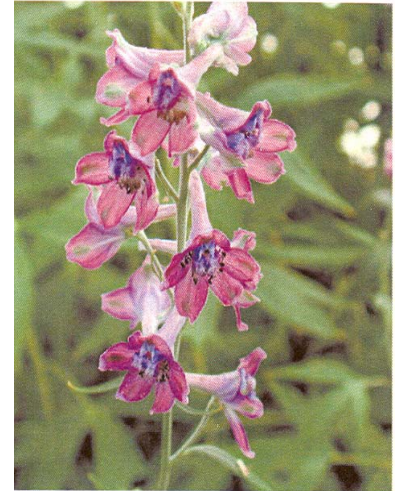

### What Am I?" by Bruce Abraham

I am a native, biennial/perennial Wisconsin plant of the Family **Asteraceae** (Aster Family); Genus **Rudbeckia**. My habitat is typically southern upland forest, but can grow in open areas and with good growing conditions naturalize quite rapidly. As a perennial, I am short-lived, but readily self-sow. My height is between 1' – 5' with multiple-branched hairy, stiff stems. My basal leaves are dark green, hairy, three-lobed. My green leaves at the base are about 1" long, oval in shape with three rounded lobes. Along my stems I have dark green leaves that are alternate, ovate with serrated edges about 4" long and 2" wide - quite coarse to the touch. At each stem end I produce a single, composite, daisy-like flower with 6 – 12 yellow ray florets surrounding a flattened cone - initially jet black, but fading to brown. My flower is 1-1/2" – 2" in diameter typically from July through October. Flies, bees, and butterflies visit for my nectar and pollen (bees, only). What Am I?

## FLOWER OF THE MONTH LARKSPUR

Larkspur is the common name for plants in the genus *Delphinium*, which has hundreds of unique species that can be found throughout the Northern



Hemisphere and in parts of Africa as well. Numerous cultivars have been domesticated for gardens throughout the world, and larkspur is particularly associated with old fashioned English gardens. All larkspurs have deeply lobed leaves which grow close to the ground, coupled with tall stalks of densely concentrated flowers, and tend to bloom in the early spring. Many larkspurs have spurred flowers which resemble the feet of birds, and the stalks can sometimes grow as high as seven feet in height.

Depending on where larkspur is found growing, it can be an annual or perennial. Because the plants are highly susceptible to frost and extreme heat, they tend to favor moderate climates, and will die back in the heat of summer. If the winter is mild enough, the larkspur will survive to bloom into the next year. Because larkspur forms rhizomes, or sprawling networks of roots and sprouts, it will spread readily in mild conditions, and gardeners can also separate the rhizomes to encourage the plant to spread. Larkspur can also be found at very high elevations, and the taller growing varieties of the plant appear to prefer the height, reseeding themselves every year.

The flowers range in color from white to pale pink to lavender to blue, and some exotic hybrids have been bred with striking color combinations like rich violet flowers with white centers. The plant prefers full sun to partial

shade and moist soil while it is growing, and will grow in almost any USDA zone, depending on the varietal. Most gardeners start larkspur from seed directly in the garden, because the plant will experience transplant shock otherwise. If starting larkspur in a greenhouse, use biodegradable peat pots, which can be planted directly into the soil. Larkspur is also toxic, and gardeners with grazing animals should take care to plant larkspur out of their reach. The plant is apparently quite palatable, and also high in calcium, so some animals will eat it to correct dietary deficiencies. Cows, especially, have been known to die after eating only small amounts of the attractive plant, and many people who pasture cows wait until the heat of summer to let them out onto fields where larkspur blooms, as the majority of the plants will have died back at that point. ## JULY GARDEN TASKS

### Houseplants, Perennials and Annuals

- Week 1 & 2. Clean bird baths every second or third day to prevent mosquito larva development.
- Take the timers for irrigation systems out of automatic mode to prevent over watering and water waste.
- Bearded Iris should be divided shortly after blooming.
- Prune flowering shrubs after they finish blooming.
- Fertilize annuals and hardy garden mums using a 20-20-20- fertilizer.
- Dead head plants as blooms fade.
- Keep watchful eye for insect invasions.
- Week 2. Make final pinch of mums.
- After strawberry harvest is complete Spring varieties should be mowed to 5cm and suckers removed. This helps renew the plants
- Week 3. Bleeder trees such as maples should be pruned now.
- Week 4. Order fall planting items.
- Raise cutting height of mower for hot weather cutting to no less than 2 ½ inches.
- Transplant Madonna lilies, Bleeding Hearts, Oriental Poppies now.

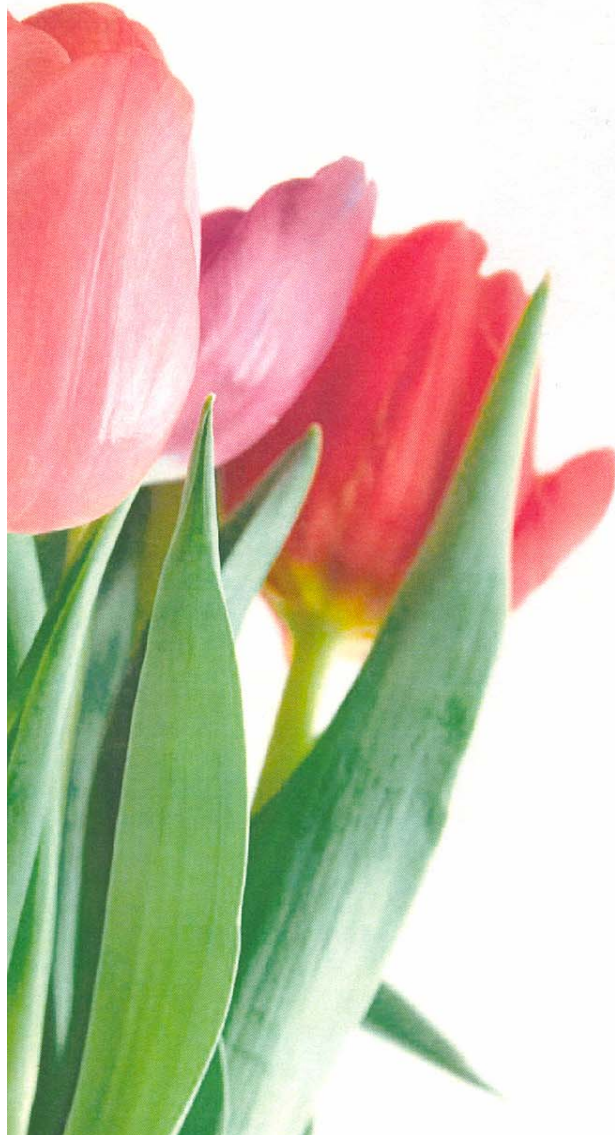
